## The UN Principle of Progressive Realization...

- ...of the Human Right to Sanitation SDG6.2 and 6.3
- Developed by IWA network thought leaders as an outcome of the 7<sup>th</sup> WWF

- Wastewater treatment schemes must meet legal discharge standards, defined within the legislation of almost all countries.
- In fact, standards are rarely met (up to 90 per cent...).
- Too often, standards thereby achieve adverse effects,
  - considered unrealistic
  - any cost efficient intervention, improving the current situation but not meeting the discharge standard, would legally threaten its initiator.
- progressive treatment performance, phased approach over the next 12 years as we proceed towards SDG 6.2 and 6.3
  - develop own standards
  - take adequate time to implement a suitable regulatory framework
  - develop the institutional capacity necessary for enforcement
